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Be Prepared for Summer Storms

Rest assured, when a storm strikes, RG&E is ready to respond and restore power. You should be prepared, too. Here are a few tips:

- Have flashlights, a battery-operated radio or television, and fresh batteries handy.
- Have a working telephone. Note: Cordless and digital phones may not work during a power interruption; it's best to have at least one corded phone in your home.
- Store adequate supplies of water and non-perishable food.
- Use surge protection. If you do not have surge protection, unplug sensitive electronic equipment televisions, microwave ovens, VCRs and computers – that could be damaged by lightning or power surges.
- If you have a garage door opener, know how to manually open the door.
- If you or a member of your household relies on life-sustaining equipment, don't wait! Contact us now at 1.800.743.2110. We'll keep you updated on power restoration efforts if the duration of the outage extends beyond 24 hours, and notify you before any planned interruption of your electricity service for maintenance.

If Your Power Is Interrupted:

- Check with your neighbors to see if their power is out. If it isn't, double check your own circuit breakers or fuse box. To report an outage, call us at 1.800.743.1701 or visit **rge.com** and click on "Outage Central" if you have access to the Internet during a power outage (using a laptop or from another location).
- Listen to a battery-powered radio for updates.
- Turn off or unplug major appliances and sensitive electronic equipment.
- Leave a light turned on so you will know when power is restored.
- Avoid "peeking" into your refrigerator or freezer to help extend the length of time food will keep.

Two Life-Saving Safety Tips:

- Stay Away From Downed Power Lines Stay far away and tell others to stay away from downed wires. Even lines that appear "dead" can be deadly. Call us immediately at **1.800.743.1701** to report any downed lines.
- 2 NEVER Enter a Flooded Basement If flooding of your home or business is about to occur or has already occurred, call us immediately to turn off services.

Use Energy Wisely This Summer

While longer days and warmer weather make us less dependent on energy for light and heat, there are many opportunities to practice wise energy use.

Staying cool indoors >> If you have storm windows that you remove and replace with screens for the summer, consider which windows you actually open. Leaving some storm windows in place may save you work in the fall and help keep rooms cooler, especially if you use air conditioning. Another "cool" technique is to close blinds and drapes to block direct sunlight.

Tips for using your air conditioner:

- >> Set the thermostat no lower than 78 degrees; close windows and exterior doors.
- >> Keep curtains and furniture away from air intakes and vents.
- >> Avoid cooking, baking and other indoor heat-producing activities on hot days.
- >> On moderately hot days, use fans instead of air conditioners.

Follow the manufacturer's recommendations to ensure that your air conditioner stays in tip-top shape and runs efficiently.

Electric fans >> Fans can be an economical way to make your home more comfortable. Attic fans, window fans, floor and table fans are all cost-effective.

Window fans give better ventilation than portable fans, but attic or "whole-house" fans are often the best choice. Talk with your appliance dealer or home center specialist to find the fan best suited to your home.



When we need to cut trees or tree limbs during post-storm power restoration, we need to leave the trimmed materials behind, so we can focus on quickly restoring service. Our first priority in responding to a power interruption is ensuring your safety. In the case of a widespread interruption of service, we first repair our main facilities (transmission lines and substations) that bring electricity to your neighborhood. Next, we work on our local electricity delivery system that includes the poles and power lines along streets and roads. As part of this process, we take into account the needs of facilities such as hospitals, nursing homes, and fire and police stations. We also focus on our customers who depend on electrically-operated, life-sustaining equipment. This is a time-proven process that ensures we restore your service safely and as quickly and efficiently as possible.
