

Supply Charges

Supply Charge **\$86.61**

Supply is a pass-through cost from which the utility does not profit. If customers have RG&E as their supplier, energy is sold at the price at which it is bought.

Utility (RG&E)

Customer Charge/Delivery Charge **\$63.45**

These charges go towards delivering power, customer service, and investments into the grid.

Bill and Payment Process Charge **\$0.89**

These charges cover the cost of creating, handling, and processing customers' bills and payments for RG&E customers.

Transition Charge **-\$0.85**

This charge reflects the difference between the market price of electricity and the price of RG&E's long-term electricity supply contracts from when it owned power generation (this may be a positive or negative charge).

Revenue Decoupling Charge **\$2.52**

A credit or a charge on the bill that reflects the difference between forecasted and actual delivery service revenue.

Merchant Function Charge **\$3.31**

A per-kWh charge reflects RG&E administrative costs for obtaining electricity supply and applies to customers receiving supply from RG&E.

Government

Customer Charge/Delivery Charge **\$19.09**

These charges go towards taxes and funding energy efficiency requirements.

Transition Charge **\$3.78**

This charge goes towards state government programs and mandates, like the Electric Vehicle Make-Ready Program. These charges are not individually shown on the bill.


System Benefits Charge (SBC) **\$2.71**

This charge is used to fund clean energy activities conducted by the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA).

Zero Emissions/Renewable Energy Charges **\$2.88**

The State requires a zero-emissions charge and renewable energy charge to be included in supply charges.

Variable to local taxes and surcharges **\$7.72**



Key to colors

- **Supply charges:** A pass-through cost from which the utility does not profit. For customers with RG&E as their supplier, energy is sold at the same price at which it is purchased.
- **RG&E charges:** Charges that go toward operations, maintenance, customer service, administrative costs and continued investments in the grid.
- **Government charges:** Charges that go toward government requirements and taxes.
- **Authorized recovery mechanism:** Charges established as a recovery mechanism.

Customer Charge/Delivery Charge \$19.09

A portion of these two charges go towards taxes and funding energy efficiency requirements. **These are government required charges.**

Transition Charge \$3.78

Over half of this charge goes towards state government programs and mandates, like the Electric Vehicle Make-Ready Program. These charges are not individually shown on the bill. **These are government required charges.**

System Benefits Charge (SBC) \$2.71

This charge is used to fund clean energy activities conducted by the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA). **These are government required charges.**

Customer Charge/Delivery Charge \$63.45

The rest of these two charges go towards delivering power, customer service, and investments into the grid.

Transition Charge -\$0.85

The remaining part of this charge reflects the difference between the market price of electricity and the price of RG&E's long-term electricity supply contracts from when it owned power generation (this may be a positive or negative charge).

Revenue Decoupling Charge \$2.52

A credit or a charge on the bill that reflects the difference between forecasted and actual delivery service revenue.

Recovery Charge \$1.45

This is the repayment of costs from legacy storm recovery.

Supply Charge: \$86.61


Variable to local taxes and surcharges: \$7.72

Utility (RG&E)

Customer Charge/Delivery Charge \$67.86
These charges go towards delivering gas, customer service, and investments into infrastructure.

Bill and Payment Process Charge \$0.99
These charges cover the cost of creating, handling, and processing bills and payments for RG&E customers.

Transition Charge..... \$0.29
This reflects the cost recovery from bill credits given during Covid-19.

Revenue Decoupling Charge-\$0.99
A credit or a charge on the bill that reflects the difference between forecasted and actual delivery service revenue.

Merchant Function Charge\$3.73
A per-therm charge reflects RG&E administrative costs for obtaining gas supply and applies to customers receiving supply from RG&E.


Government
